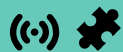
Discover the Heritage of Winterton: From Bellingring to the Winterton Show

Searching for the Saxons

Friday 11th September 10am-4pm

Join us and become an 'armchair archaeologist'!

In September 2019 metal detectorists found objects dating to the 5th and 6th centuries on a site near to Cammeringham – finds that suggest an early Anglo-Saxon cemetery. Finding one so close to Lincoln is highly unusual and marks this as a site of national significance.

Experts will be excavating the site from 1st to 11th September. Normally we would invite the local community to come along and take part, but with social distancing measures in place, sadly we can't do that. But you will be able to follow the progress of the dig online.

On Friday 11th September there will be a virtual and interactive open day at the excavation, when you will see the action as it happens, and you can ask the archaeologists all your burning questions. Keep checking Facebook for details

Discover the history of Weelsby Hall, from a fishing trawler owner's mansion house to a facility that serves the local and national needs of people with learning disabilities.

Owned by Linkage Community Trust, visit one of the grandest buildings in North East Lincolnshire not usually accessible to the public.

Weelsby Hall is vitally important to Grimsby's heritage and particularly its fishing heritage, having been built for George Sleight in the late 1800s. Linkage Community Trust, a Lincolnshire-based charity, acquired North East Lincolnshire's grandest building in 1982 to serve the local and national needs of people with learning disabilities.

This is a rare opportunity to explore the grounds of Weelsby Hall and the interior entrance hall. Find out about the heritage of this wonderful place through a self-guided tour and learn more about how a grant from National Lottery Heritage Fund is helping Linkage to explore how the charity can preserve the hall for future generations. **Numbers are limited and booking is essential.**
