Heritage Trust Lincolnshire is keen to develop its team of volunteers as they are central to the successful delivery of the Trust's charitable activities. Our volunteer Co-ordinator Jackie Goodall has recently been appointed and has set up a volunteer steering group. The group has met for the first time and plan to meet every couple of months with the following aims:

- To ensure that all volunteers are looked after and valued by Heritage Lincolnshire.
- To ensure that all HTL volunteers are kept informed of volunteering opportunities
- To provide opportunities for all volunteers to meet up, share experiences, have fun and become involved in developing future learning experiences.
- To encourage volunteers to contribute ideas for new initiatives.

## Digger's Corner

**What might you find at the bottom of a hole in your garden?**



Clay Pipe bowl  
c.1880 – 1900

Most people have at some time or other come across the remains of clay pipes whilst digging their garden. (see pic.) Usually they are plain stems. Sometimes you may find one with a decorated bowl.

However, if you were really lucky, you might find one like this.

This example is a figural pipe bowl of an elephant's head found in Kings Lynn on an excavation carried out by APS.

It is near-identical to examples produced by the Gambier pipe-making firm in France in the period 1880-1890. (*Pijpenkabinet* nd)

Although there is a possibility that this is a French product, it is more likely to be an English copy, probably produced in London. Other figural pipes copying French and Belgian originals have previously been identified as being produced in London. (*Woodcock 1989, 19*)

## Spotlight

Pete is now using his artistic talents during training to be an volunteer archaeological illustrator with the Trust with training and guidance from archaeologist Denise Buckley.
